
# Army Navy Rugby 2019 (yes,we lost again!) We still all had a great time



#### Morpedo Leading Wireman H. Pugh

I joined PENELOPE at Portsmouth after her return from U.S.A. where she had been refitted with the latest radar and gyro-controlled cerlikoas. I served for Hostilities Only, about 90% of the ship's company were Active Service personnel. It was a happy ship and morale was high.

Action occurred in the Mediterranean.A 6 miss inch shell fired from shore batteries on Pantellaria resulted in no casualties and only slight damage to the seamen's heads (toilets).

PENELOPE helped the Army in its advance along the North African coast -- Bone, Philippeville, Algiers, Oran. She was involved a good deal with the Sicily, Salergo and Anzio landings. During action off Cos and Leros in the Aegean the ship was hit with a 1,000 lb. bomb which went right through her, hit one of the propeller shafts and ricochetted into a fuel tank without exploding; it was recovered at Alex. The casualties it caused were 1 officer and 9 ratings killed and 5 officers and 51 ratings injured.

On 8 September 1943 PENELOPE sailed from Algiers for the occupation of Taranto. We were in company with AURORA, DIDO and SIRIUS and we were all full of the First Parachute Division. ABDIEL hit a mine in Taranto Harbour and sank. It was the time that Italy was changing sides.

We left Naples early in the morning of 18 February 1944 to return to Anzio beach. It was cold and snowing. We were making 32 knots when at about 0655 we were hit in thebatern by a torpedo. The propellers were damaged and the ship stopped and listed to starboard. I was in the messdeck off watch at the time. The order was piped to jettison all top weight on the starboard side. I rushed to the upper deck, inflated my lifejacket as I could hardly swim, and released three torpedoes. The gunners were already throwing over the side 4 inch shells from the Kun deak above. The water was nearly up to my knees in the starboard waist of the ship when a second torpedo hit amidships on the starboard side just below where I was standing. The next thing I remember, after a few seconds, I was a make under the water, being knocked about a bit, still going down and the water got darker. Then suddenly I stopped descending, things calmed down and my lifejacket started to bring me to the surface. I was astonished to see no sign of themeking PENELOPE. There were a few bits of wreckage and a bot of thick oil on the surface. I amanaged to see three other ratings clinging on to a hazel rod fender so I joined them. We were hanging on to this fend er when a Tank Landing Vessel appeared; it was on its way to Anzio with troops of the Queen's Regiment. After coming alongside we had the problem of boarding the vessel. I was cold and could not hold a rope so a net was sent down and we threaded our arms through the squares to be pulled up one at a time. I asked the soldiers if a lot had been picked up and was told that another landing vessel was helping in the rescue. I was also told that that I was picked up at 1315. I did not realise that I had been in the water somlong. After a hot shower and a drink and with a blanket round me we returned to Naples where we received a parcel from a Red Cross Nurse as soon as we put our feet on the jetty. All the survivors were put on a troopship and issued with Army kit. After a few days we transferred to an Italian cruiser for passage to Malta, then waited for passage home where I arrived at the end of March 1944.

417 men, including the Captain, lost their lives in PENELOPE. The bodies of the Captain and 12 others were picked up and buried at Naples. It was learnt later that U?boat 401 had fired the torpedoes.









